HHCP is governed by The Greenburger Center for Social and Criminal Justice, Inc. (Greenburger Center). Greenburger Center is focused on reforming the criminal justice system particularly for individuals with behavioral health disorders whose involvement in the criminal justice system is often a barrier to recovery. Greenburger Center and HHCP do not currently operate any other programs, however two of the members of the Board of Directors, Ralph Acquila, MD, and Rebecca Ziff, LCSW, have extensive experience providing mental health services and operating Article 31 programs. Additionally, the Greenburger Center has a Board of Advisors, who have experience operating Article 31 programs, to provide guidance on policies and best practices.

The proposed 16-bed Community Residence will serve as an alternative to incarceration for adults who have at least one felony level charge and a serious mental illness. To ensure that this population's unique needs are met, including the trauma associated with incarceration, HHCP has partnered with Argus Community, Inc. (Argus). Argus will establish a co-located Continuing Day Treatment Program (CDTP) to meet the clinical needs of the individuals admitted to HHCP.

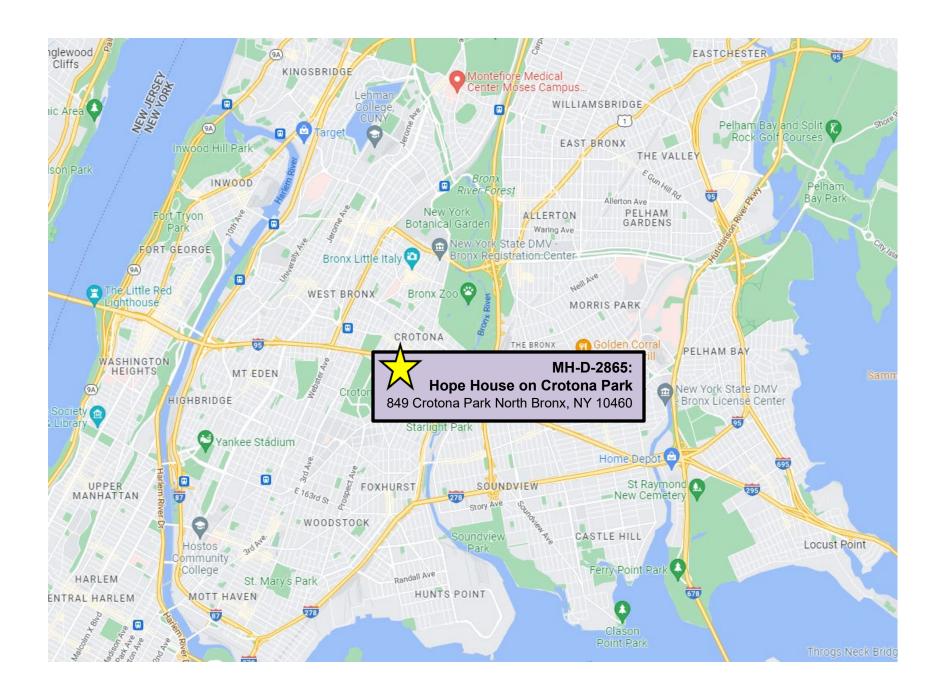
Need

Based on the data from the VERA Institute of Justice and the Journal of American Medical Association a disproportionate number of individuals involved in the criminal justice system also have a behavioral health diagnosis. It has been shown that incarcerated individuals with a mental health diagnosis are often placed in solitary confinement. Individuals placed in solitary conferment are more likely than their peers to die or be re-incarcerated in the first year after their release from prison. VERA Institute of Justice found that with appropriate treatment and access to community-based services this population is less likely to be re-incarcerated and more likely to lead healthy and productive lives. Existing programs that serve this population are generally for adults with lower-level offenses and less serious mental health diagnosis.

HealthAlliance Hospital (HAMAC) Mary's Ave. Campus is a part of Westchester County Health Care Corporation (WCHCC.) WCHCC is currently licensed by OMH to operate a total of 181 inpatient psychiatric beds across its network of hospitals, with HAMAC hospital in Kingston representing 40 of those beds. In addition to its inpatient services, WCHCC provides various outpatient services, including 3 Mental Health Clinics, 1 ACT Program, and 1 Partial Hospitalization Program that serves Adults and Adolescents. Counties served by WCHCC includes Westchester, Putnam, Dutchess, Rockland, Orange, Ulster, Sullivan and Delaware

Need

This proposed bed reduction is directly related to the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic and action taken by Health Alliance to convert the entire Mary's Ave campus as a COVID-19 surge hospital. During this time, an additional 15 bed psychiatric unit was created at the Mid-Hudson Regional Hospital to ensure continued access of behavioral health services. From this experience, WCHCC realized the benefits of consolidating most inpatient psychiatric beds to the Mid-Hudson River Campus, including the opportunity to develop a Center of Excellence (COE) for both psychiatric and chemical dependency services and improved overall operational and financial performance for the agency.

Benefits of developing a COE include the development of specialized behavioral health programs, creation of modernized patient care spaces to improve patient outcomes and experiences, consolidation of scarce resources and management to gain operational efficiencies and a greater chance to attract needed physicians and staff to a more comprehensive program. Although this application seeks approval to reduce inpatient bed capacity by 20 beds at the Mary's Ave. Campus, a second Comprehensive PAR

application will be submitted by Mid-Hudson Regional Hospital to expand their inpatient psychiatric bed capacity by 20. Resulting in 20 beds at the Mary's Ave Campus and 60 beds for the Mid-Hudson Regional Hospital. Therefore, the overall 80 psychiatric bed capacity will not be reduced in the Hudson Valley region.

HealthAlliance is currently comprised of two hospital campuses, Mary's Avenue and Broadway. The proposed renovations include merging the campuses to consolidate all medical and psychiatric inpatient beds into the Mary's Avenue location. The renovations will establish two inpatient psychiatric units and ensure both units meet psychiatric support space requirements and ADA compliance. One unit will be a dedicated 15-bed psychiatric unit and the remaining 5 beds will be embedded within an adjacent medical/surgical unit and primarily reserved for psychiatric surge bed capacity.

The surge capacity beds will become operational based upon the one-week rolling average daily census of adult patients hospitalized in all inpatient psychiatric beds under WCHCC's Behavioral Health Facilities licensed by OMH. These beds will mainly be utilized for low-risk, voluntary inpatients due its proximity to the medica/surgical unit. In the event the proposed 15-bed unit is full, and the 5 surge capacity beds are not activated based upon surge bed criteria, any psychiatric patients presenting to the Mary's Avenue Campus Emergency Department that require inpatient care will be transferred by ambulance to another inpatient unit within the WCHCC Network, most likely MHRH.

Staffing Comments:

The proposed staffing model for inpatient psychiatry beds at HAMAC assumes permanent clinical and support staffing to provide multi-disciplinary psychiatric, medical, therapeutic, and social services for treatment and discharge planning. The above staffing budget includes FTEs for the 15 beds and additional flex staffing that will be available 100% of the time.

The additional 5 beds are estimated to be available 25% of the time based upon surge conditions. To facilitate rapid activation of the 20- bed program when needed, it is projected an RN and two Patient Care Technicians will be added to the staffing plan for a total of 56 FTEs.

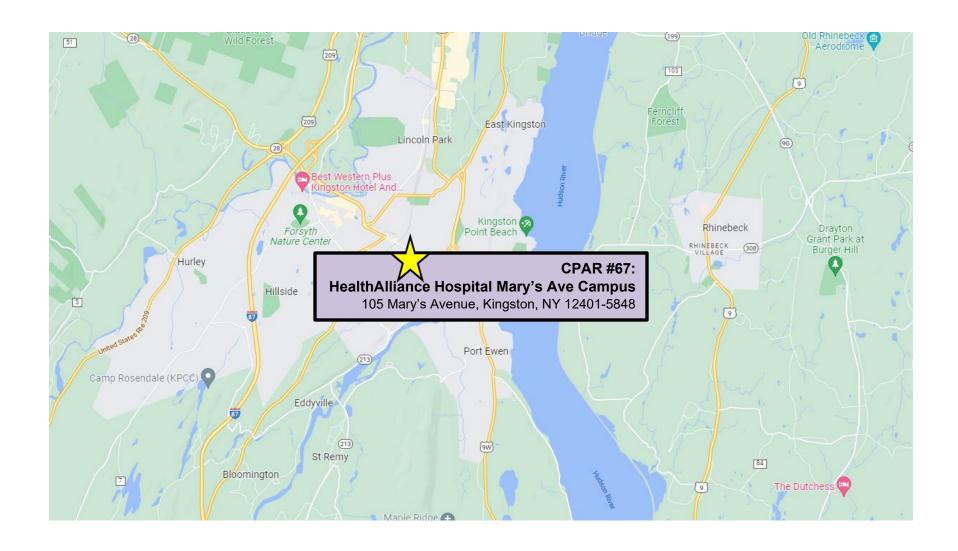
HAMAC is assuming an additional \$6 million in annual financial aid to help offset the projected revenue losses for this service. This will reduce the losses in Year 1 and Year 2 to \$1.14 million and \$1.33 million respectively. They will attempt to utilize other existing operating income to fund daily operations and services and address the remaining deficit.

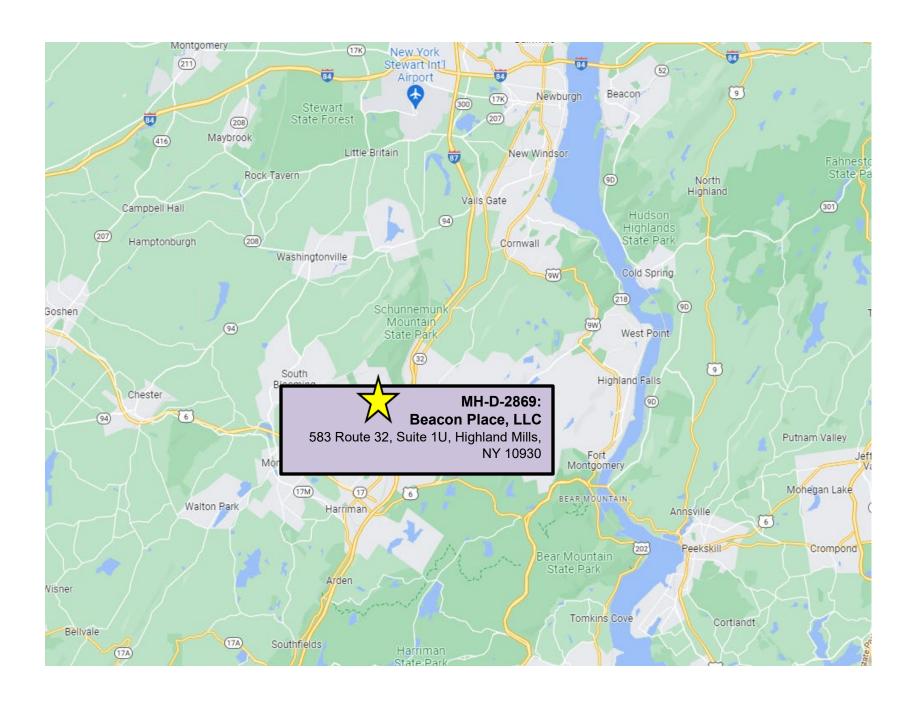
Provider's Background

Beacon Place, LLC was established in 2014 to provide private practice mental health counseling and medication treatment services to children, adolescent and adult residents of Orange and Rockland counties. It currently has a single member/owner and founder, Solomon Lebovits. Although his professional background is in real estate, Mr. Lebovits' interest in mental health has grown over the past decade having served on the board of a mental health services organization that is also licensed by OMH. For its growth and potential, Beacon Place has relied on the expertise and knowledge of experienced staff, such as its Executive Director, Randolph Bleiwas, LCSW, with expertise in mental health, trauma, and traumatic brain injury, to name a few.

Need

Beacon Place has identified service gaps in the community, primarily by the increasing demand from the communities it serves for additional mental health services. On a regular basis, more than two hundred in the past year, Beacon Place refers out consumers and other service providers seeking mental health treatment services that can best be provided at an Article 31 Clinic. Its current list of clients will also benefit greatly from the wider array of services resulting from this project. Beacon Place is seeking to expand its services to include individuals with severe and persistent mental illness to close identified gaps in mental health services. As an established provider through private practice,

Beacon Place has developed relationships with local providers and will continue to integrate and coordinate services with providers in the local mental health system.

The Rural Outreach Center (ROC) grew out of the work of Pathways Christian Fellowship, founded in 2006 by the Reverend Frank Cerny. The group was committed to founding a community outreach program along with the church. After exploring urban poverty in Buffalo, the group turned to WNY's rural areas. A survey and consultation with an expert in rural poverty showed that this population was not just under-served, but not served at all. The group held free monthly community meals to listen to residents and better understand the issues. An evolution of programs and partnerships providing "wrap-around" services began. ROC became an independent 501(c)3 in 2013. Since then, the ROC has grown significantly and continues to offer important services to people living in rural poverty in the region.

In any given month, the ROC has over 150 active participants. These participants engage with the ROC to attend counseling, play therapy, and care coordination sessions. They also engage in a variety of programs that help build their confidence and ability to be self-sufficient.

The ROC focuses our work through 5 core actions:

- 1. Minimizing charity and optimizing empowerment in everything we do
- 2. Breaking the cycle of rural poverty by emphasizing early intervention
- 3. Serving rural populations through wrap-around, centralized services
- 4. Collaborating with other agencies to avoid duplication of services
- 5. Measuring and monitoring outcomes based on the social determinants of health

Need

There has been an increase in the need for services in rural areas, but a significant decrease remains regarding the availability of services. This is particularly noticeable for children; with many demonstrating more mental, behavioral, and developmental disorders. Access to resources is a frequent challenge in rural communities, with a lack of transportation being one of the most difficult to access and provide individuals with the means to connect to any service. This in turn brings the recommendation that

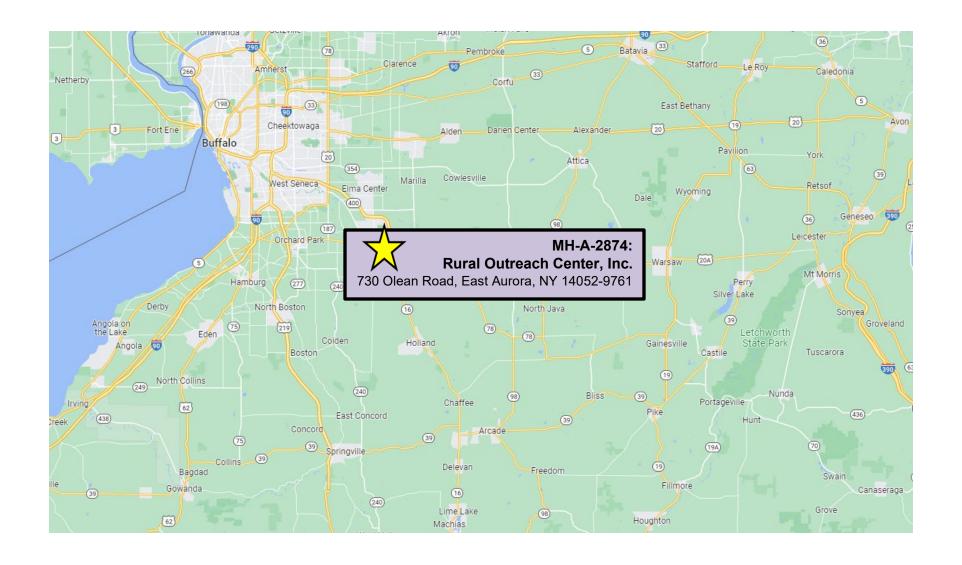
rural communities develop and foster relationships with alternative settings to help bring essential services to the rural population.

While the ROC focuses on eradicating rural poverty, the reality is that all participants, and children of those participants, deal with significant traumas in their lives. Being poor presents its own trauma through social isolations, depression, anxiety, etc.; and most participants will have additional traumas such as PTSD, personality disorders, low self-esteem, acute stress disorders, and others.

Hands on Health Associates, LLC (HoHA) operates an Article 32 Part 822 outpatient program that was established in 2016 and serves adults with substance use disorders by providing treatments focused on individuals achieving recovery. Many of the individuals receiving services at HoHA have a dual diagnosis of substance use disorder (SUD) and mental illness. Services in the program include Medication Assisted Treatment (MAT), Medical Assessments, Psychiatric Assessments, Individual, Group, and Family Counseling as well as care management.

Dr. Rogelio Thomas and Marcia Allen-Booker, LMSW, CASAC; Co-Founders of HoHA; bring over thirty years of combined experience in the fields of SUD and mental health treatment. Dr. Thomas currently in the position of Medical Director, and Mrs. Booker remains a member of the agency, having retired from the role of CEO.

Mrs. Booker obtained her CASAC in 1994, an MSW from Stony Brook University in 2007, and her LMSW in 2009. As the Executive Clinical Director for Interline Counseling Center she worked collaboratively with the Medical Director to supervise the day to day operations and ensure that appropriate services were provided to those receiving services. She also has OMH residential management experience

Dr. Thomas received his Doctor of Medicine from Harvard Medical School in 1983, and Master in Public Policy from the John F. Kennedy School of Government. He completed his internship at Brigham and Women's Hospital in 1984 and residencies in Preventive Medicine and Internal Medicine at Mount Sinai Medical Center in 1986 and 1987 respectively. He worked as the Medical Director's Consultant at Care for the Homeless, Samaritan Daytop Village, Inc., and Medical Director of their Harlem Outpatient program.

Need

While services for the mental health and SUD populations are provided in Kings county, there remains the need for additional services. The 2018 Community Board 5 Health Profile (a report that considers neighborhood health), indicated East New York and Starret City have a 65% higher rate of adult psychiatric hospitalizations than the

rest of New York City. It also points to the challenges that residents in the community have more difficulty accessing preventative services and early care, while having more stressors and interruptions in their health insurance coverage. It also indicates that people with severe mental health disorders have a higher incidence of hospitalizations and premature deaths. The COVID-19 Pandemic has created an even larger increase in the unmet need for mental health services.

The proposed Article 31 clinic will be located I the same building as the Article 32 Clinic, but each will operate as separate and distinct units. Each clinic will have its own floor in the building as well as its own staff, policies and procedures, admission criteria, concsents, and clinical documentation.

The target population for these services will be residents in Community Board 5 (CB-5), that are primarily African American (55%) and Hispanic/Latino (35%) and have a median household income of \$45,991. This works out to 23.4% of residents living in poverty. The rates of avoidable hospitalization and suicide rates are more than twice the NYC average.

The Door has been providing services to young people in New York City since 1972, when a group of young professionals in the fields of medicine, psychiatry, law, education, social work and the arts determined that alternative and innovative methods were necessary to address the issues affecting New York City's young adults, specifically those in the 12-24 age range. Today The Door is a not-for-profit corporation with a staff of about 200.

The Door's mission is to empower young people to reach their potential by providing comprehensive youth development services in a diverse and caring environment. The applicant indicates The Door has received recognition in New York City and throughout the nation for its work with young adults. In the 1990s, the World Economic Forum recognized The Door as one of six premier models for successful youth service delivery, and the United States Department of Education and the United States Department of Health and Human services chose The Door as a model program dealing with the Pressing needs of children and families in impoverished communities.

It operates The Door Health Center, a NYS DOH licensed Article 28 Diagnostic and Treatment Center (D&TC), a Federally Qualified Health Center (FQHC), that provides primary health care services, sexual and reproductive care, contraception, eyecare, dental, dermatology, nutrition, and mental health services. The Health Center is said to be recognized by the National Committee for Quality Assurance as a Level-III Patient-

Centered-Specialty-Practice, the highest level of recognition. Current mental health service delivery is supported by staff which include 4 full-time and 1 part-time licensed mental health clinicians, 1 part-time psychiatrist as well as 1 part-time psychiatry fellow who has specialized training in child and adolescent psychiatry.

Other services provided, to name a few, include employment, internships, education and vocational counseling and placement services; college advisement and tutoring; counseling for anger management, crisis intervention, gender identity and many other issues facing this age group. It also provides regularly scheduled, free creative arts classes, including a range of performing and visual arts, music, and dance. Free food and nutrition services are offered every evening Monday through Friday, as well as sessions with a nutritionist, cooking lessons and tips on healthy grocery shopping on a budget.

Need

Through its services and involvement in the community, The Door has identified 400-500 individuals in need of outpatient mental health services. A number of these are served at its Article 28 D&TC, which has reached the 30% threshold limit for providing mental health services at a D&TC. Article 31 certification would allow The Door to continue to provide mental health services to its participants and allow it to provide a wider array of mental health treatment services.

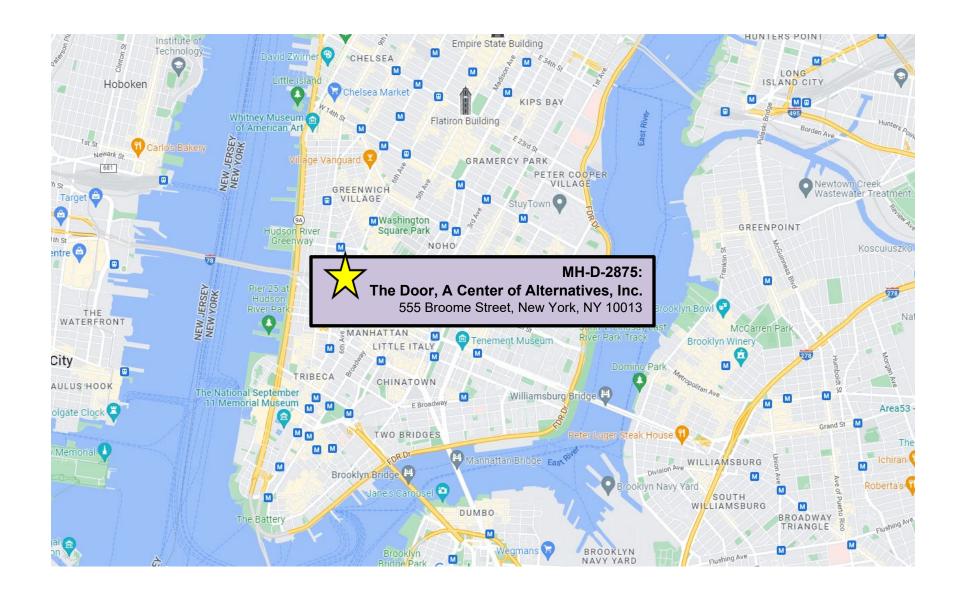
The projections are also based on a 2018 NYC DOHMH Community Health Survey, which indicated 8% of the people in Manhattan Community District 3 are without needed medical care and 11% have no health insurance.

The Door also indicates that during the covid19 pandemic of 2020-2021, it provided Telehealth services to deliver mental health services and was very useful in reaching individuals in need of mental health services which The Door hopes to continue to provide.

NYC Health + Hospitals Corporation is the nation's largest municipal health care delivery system in the United States with an integrated network of hospitals, community-based health centers, long-term care and rehabilitation facilities, home care services, correctional health services and a health plan, with a mission dedicated to providing comprehensive personalized care.

In 1967, the NYC Mayor and NY Governor envisioned a hospital for North Brooklyn to replace an older public hospital in Greenpoint that wasn't meeting the needs of the community. That vision included several levels of care, single bedded rooms, and the same amenities for the public hospital as those found in private hospitals. This vision was realized in 1982, after the City's financial crisis in the 1970s. Since then, Woodhull has provided outstanding heath care for residents of North Brooklyn including Bushwick, Williamsburg, Greenpoint, Bedford-Stuyvesant and Fort Greene.

Need

Woodhull is requesting a 23-bed reduction of adult inpatient psychiatric beds as a result of its analysis of the utilization rate of inpatient units in Kings County and New York City overall. Woodhull is committed to embracing clinical practice as a way to prevent avoidable inpatient psychiatric admission through enhanced access to outpatient services that meet the clinical needs of adult patients. Since 2016 the hospital has been operating and staffing 89 general adult psychiatric beds on four of the five inpatient psychiatric units. There has not been a negative impact on patient care, and the 89 operationalized beds have been able to meet the need for adult inpatient psychiatric services. The need for adult inpatient beds has declined significantly between 2016 and 2021. Admissions and discharges have gone down by 39%, and patient days have declined by 23% for an overall occupancy of 61% based

on 112 certified beds and an occupancy rate of 77% based on the 89 staffed/operational beds. Over this six-year period, the average length of stay has been consistent at 17.5 days.

The decertification of 23 adult psychiatric beds, will not negatively impact the provision of inpatient psychiatric services. There will be adequate bed (and patient day) capacity to meet the needs of individuals requiring inpatient psychiatric care.

Woodhull is committed to providing outpatient adult services in order to better meet the treatment needs of patients, as well as to complement Woodhull's efforts to avoid preventable hospital admissions for psychiatric services. The services provided include mobile crisis teams for children, adolescents, and adults, an Assertive Community Treatment (ACT) team for adults, and a comprehensive psychiatric emergency program (CPEP) with six (6) adult extended observation beds. This array of services is integrated with patient centered primary care services for adults with chronic conditions such as diabetes, hypertension, cardiovascular disease, respiratory disease, and infectious diseases, including Hepatitis B, Hepatitis C, and HIV/AIDS.

Additionally, Woodhull had concurrently submitted a Limited Review Application (LRA) number 221168 with the NY State Department of Health (DOH) for the decrease in the number of beds. At this time, the LRA is waiting for the OMH recommendation to complete the DOH review process.

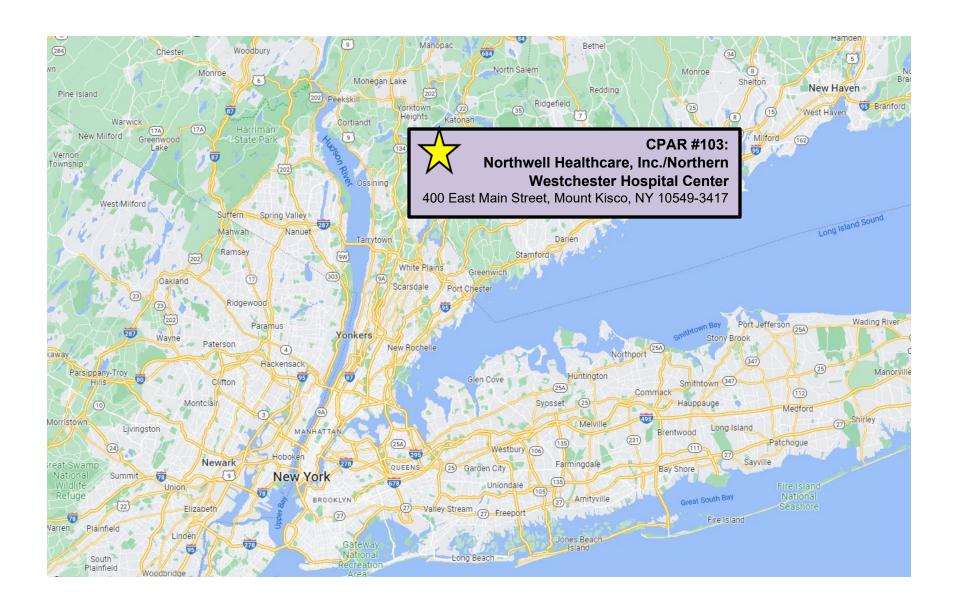
