Comprehensive Crisis Response System

New York State is developing a comprehensive crisis response system, available to all New Yorkers regardless of ability to pay.

OMH and OASAS are committed to developing a statewide crisis system of expanded, enhanced and connected services composed of:

- Telephonic triage through the implementation of 988
- Mobile crisis teams
- Crisis residential programs
- Crisis stabilization centers
- Other community services and supports



Crisis Stabilization Centers (CSC)

Part 600 Regulations: joint regulations with OASAS and OMH

- Two types of Crisis Stabilization Centers are being developed:
 - Supportive Crisis Stabilization Centers (SCSC)
 - Intensive Crisis Stabilization Centers (ICSC)
- This RFP is specific to the development of ICSCs.
- RFP for Supportive CSCs is anticipated in summer 2022.



Intensive Crisis Stabilization Centers

Centers offer:

- Voluntary crisis treatment services, with an emphasis on peer and recovery support up to 24 hours 365 days a year in a safe therapeutic environment.
- Urgent treatment to adults, children, adolescents and families experiencing all levels of emotional distress, including acute mental health and/or substance use crisis.
- Rapid access to services to assist in diversion from a higher level of care, including medication treatment for management of substance use and mental health symptoms.



Crisis Stabilization Services

All Crisis Stabilization Services:

- Triage and Assessment
- Medical screening
- Therapeutic interventions including crisis counseling, psychoeducation, crisis deescalation/intervention
- Peer Support Services
- Ongoing observation
- Care collaboration with recipient's friends, family or care providers (with consent)
- Discharge and aftercare planning

ICSCs Also Include:

- Psychiatric Diagnostic Evaluation and Plan
- Psychosocial Assessment
- Medication Management
- Medication for Addiction Treatment
- Medication Administration and Monitoring
- Mild to Moderate Detoxification Services

Peers

- Integral part of the Crisis Stabilization Model.
- Peers have lived experience that inform their practice and expertise among various populations, including Peers who specialize in working with children, families, and adults both with mental health, and/or substance use crisis.

 Peers are the leading experts on recovery and their experience informs every aspect of Crisis Stabilization Centers.



Services for Children, Adolescents & Families

- All CSCs are expected to serve children and adolescents.
- CSCs are required to have a designated waiting area and treatment area to serve children and families.
- A trained/educated staff member must be on staff 24/7 who has training in child and adolescent development and behavioral health.
- CSCs will collaborate with the following providers, including but not limited to:
 - Schools
 - Pediatrician offices
 - Children's mental health and substance use providers



Mental Health | Services and Supports

ICSC Staffing

- Staffing plans will reflect program needs identified in collaborative planning and the service area's demographic profile.
- Peers are a crucial part of a Center's program and staffing plan.
- Comprised of a multidisciplinary team able to meet service area needs and varying acuity levels.
- Develop staff numbers will be based on 24/7 operations.

Staff will include but not be limited to:

- Oversight of a Medical Director.
- At least one Psychiatrist or Psychiatric Nurse Practitioner, a Credentialed Alcoholism and Substance Abuse Counselor, and a Certified or Credentialed Peer Specialist on-duty and available.
- A Registered Nurse on-site twenty-four hours per day, seven days per week.
 - On-duty means the individual being physically present or on call and available which includes the
 ability to come on-site as need.

Collaboration in CSC Program Development

- Participation in county and community planning, active collaboration in Community Service Boards including Local Service Plans is crucial to serving community needs.
- Agencies are expected to collaborate with their Directors of Community Services (DCSs)/ Local Government Units (LGUs) in program development.
- Centers will collaborate with the following:
 - OMH Field Offices and OASAS Regional Offices
 - Law enforcement agencies
 - Emergency Medical Services (EMS)
 - Schools
 - Hospitals
 - Other community programs and providers



Intensive Crisis Stabilization Center RFP

OMH and OASAS is making funds available for the development of 12 ICSCs:

- 3 Centers in the NYC economic development region
- 9 Centers outside of NYC, in the remaining economic development regions

Eligibility

Eligible applicants are:

- Not-for-profit agencies with 501(c) (3) incorporation or;
- Public Benefit Corporations with experience providing mental health and substance use services to persons with serious mental illness and/or substance use disorders;
- Licensed, certified or otherwise authorized by OMH, OASAS or NYS Department of Health;
- In compliance with the application certification requirements of the Offices; and
- In good standing at the time of certification approval.

Awardees need a joint operating certificate to provide services, under Part 600.

- Certification process should begin immediately after award notification
- ICSCs are expected to be operational by January 2023.



RFP Funding

Award includes:

- One-time start-up funds: \$1.67 million
- State-aid: \$1.4 million/year
- Capital funding, if needed, will be available for up to \$1,000,000 to be spent within 12 months of contract execution.
 - Providers must commit to meet start-up spending requirements.
- OMH/OASAS are currently developing a Medicaid SPA to be submitted to CMS for purposes of establishing Medicaid billing/reimbursement mechanism.
